

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Introduction

This edition of *Stats in brief* is being released to coincide with the ten-year anniversary of the first democratic elections in South Africa. The compilers have therefore attempted to present data covering as much as possible of the past decade.

There were, however, a number of factors preventing coverage of the full ten years. First, the cut-off point for updating data was 30 September 2003. In most cases it has not been possible to report beyond 2002. Second, comparable data were not available in all instances, as some variables or data-collection methods have altered, as needs of stakeholders have changed and certain improvements been made to the data collection methods. Thus, whilst some tables cover up to eight years, in other cases comparable data are only available for three or four years.

As always, we invite users to comment on the usefulness of this booklet. More detailed information on any of the topics included here may be obtained from the Stats SA publications and releases mentioned, or from our User Information Services or the website.

Definitions and terms used in this publication

Collective living quarters

Living quarters where certain facilities are shared by groups of individuals or households. They can be divided into: (a) hotels, motels, guest houses, etc.; (b) workers' hostels and student residences; and (c) institutions.

Economically active

A person of working age (15-65 years) who is available for work, and is either employed or unemployed.

Language spoken most often in the household

The language most often used by the individual at home, whether or not they consider it their mother tongue.

Not economically active

Persons not in the labour force, such as housewives/homemakers, students and scholars, pensioners and retired people, and any others not seeking work during the reference period.

Official or strict definition of unemployment

Those people within the **economically active** population who: (a) did not work in the seven days prior to the reference day; (b) wanted to work and were available to start work within a week; and (c) had taken active steps to look for work or start some form of self-employment in the previous four weeks.

Extract from the *Report of the Census Subcommittee to the South African Statistics Council on Census 2001*

Preliminary investigations indicate that the 2001 census probably resulted in:

- An underestimate of the number of children below age five;¹
- an overestimate of the number of teenagers aged between 10 and 20;
- an underestimate of the number of men relative to the number of women;¹
- an underestimate of the number in the white population;
- higher than expected numbers aged 80 and older, in the African population;
- an underestimate of the number of foreign-born, since some identified themselves incorrectly as being South African-born;
- age misstatement in the range 60-74;
- an overestimate of the extent of unemployment;
- an underestimate of those who were employed for only a few hours per week;

- an underestimate of household income; and
- an overestimate the number of paternal orphans and the number of fathers missing from the household.

¹ This is a common feature of censuses, particularly in developing countries.

In addition:

- Scanning problems caused some births to be recorded in the wrong province. The number of cases is relatively small and should not lead to too much distortion for most purposes for which these data are used; however, it does produce obviously erroneous results in when one tries to estimate the extent of inter-provincial migration of those born since the previous census.
- The fertility data (numbers of children ever born, children surviving) are problematic.

Tables comparing Census data

For Census 2001, imputation was used to allocate values for unavailable, unknown, incorrect or inconsistent responses to other categories. 'Undetermined' values were used for only a few variables in a few cases (such as industry and occupation). For Census '96, all such values were grouped as 'Other' or 'Unspecified'.

Preface

The achievement of democracy in any country is indeed an important event to celebrate. In this regard, an excellent opportunity for festivity presents itself in South Africa after ten years of democratic rule.

But ten years of freedom is also a time for reflecting on how far the country has progressed in terms of its socio-economic development, and how far it still has to go. Measurement of the change that has taken place in South Africa since the momentous event of the first free and fair elections becomes increasingly important for monitoring and planning purposes. Statistics South Africa (Stats SA), as the official statistics agency of the country, has a vital role to play in this regard, through the process and products of its quantitative data collections and analyses.

In this document, Stats SA focuses on information from the various data series that have been collected over the period from 1994 to 2003, in order to give a summary of the changes that have taken place in the country. We are not able to present data for the full ten years for most topics, since some collections are new, and in other cases 2003 data have not yet been processed. Nevertheless, we cover a wide spectrum of statistics. Numbers reflecting demographic, social and economic change are included. For example, data on vital statistics, documented

migration, industry-based statistics, the labour market, national accounts, development measures such as education and access to services, and economic indices such as the consumer price index are all presented.

Our mission is to provide users with official statistics that enable them to become more competent in what they do. As the next decade of freedom dawns, statistics and information will set the scene as an anchor for decision-making, a barometer for monitoring progress, a radar for determining direction and finally an auditor for assessing impact.

We hope that this issue will be useful, not only for planners in national, provincial and local government, but also for the private sector, and the various structures within civil society that promote democracy and good governance. Finally I would like to thank the team that worked on this commemorative release.





In both 1996 and 2001, Northern Cape, the largest province in the country, had the smallest population (840 321 in 1996 and 822 727 in 2001), while Gauteng, the smallest province, had the second largest population (7,3 million in 1996 and 8,8 million in 2001). KwaZulu-Natal had the largest population in both years (8,4 million in 1996 and 9,4 million in 2001) in South Africa.



The largest increase in population size over the five year period between censuses was in Gauteng (20%), followed by the Western Cape (14%). The Eastern Cape and the Free State each showed growth rates of less than 3%, while in the Northern Cape there were 2% fewer people in 2001 than in 1996. The census results show that the South African population has increased from 40,5 million people in 1996 to 44,8 million people in 2001 – a growth rate of 10%. Internal migration of people from the less industrialised to the more industrialised provinces may in part explain these differences in population growth.






4.2 Arrivals and departures of foreign travellers, 1994-2002 (thousands)


4.3 Arrivals and departures of South African residents, 1994-2002 (thousands)








