Glossary

Age-specific fertility rate (ASFR)	Measures the annual number of births to women of a specified age or age group per 1,000 women in that age group.
Agriculture	This term is used to describe crops, livestock, and fishing activities.
Armed robbery	The taking of money or goods in the possession of another, from his or her person or immediate presence, by force or intimidation using deadly weapon.
Assets	Assets are the property of a business. They may be classified as: Current assets; consisting of cash, stock and book debts; fixed assets; consisting of buildings, plants and machinery; and intangible assets being the value of good will or patents.
Base period	The reference period, to which a series of index numbers relate, this usually expressed as 100.
BCG	(Bacillus Camete Guerin) This is a vaccine against Tuberculosis.
Board Money - (M3)	This is equivalent to (M2) A plus foreign currency deposits.
Broad Money - (M2)	This consists of the currency in circulation, demand, time and savings deposits. The deposits are held by the private sector and exclude those held by the central government.
Broad Money - (M2) A	This is equivalent to (M2) plus certificates of deposits.
Child Mortality Rate	Number of deaths of children aged one year and above but below 5 years of age per 1,000 live births.
Civil case	A lawsuit brought to redress a private wrong such as breach of contract, encroachment, or negligence; or to enforce civil remedies such as compensation, damages, and injunction.
Contraceptive Prevalence rate	Is defined as the percentage of women of reproductive age who or whose sexual partner is currently using, any form of modern contraception method.
Crime	An offence for which one may be punished by law.
Criminal case	Prosecution by the State of a person or organization, for committing a public wrong considered an offense against the State. Standard of proof for crimes is higher than for civil wrongs (torts) and, for major crimes such as a murder, guilt must be established beyond a reasonable doubt (see proof beyond a reasonable doubt).
Crude Birth Rate (CBR)	The number of live births per 1,000 persons in a population in a year.
Crude Death Rate	Number of deaths per 1,000 populations in a given year.
DPT	This is a vaccine against three diseases namely: Diphtheria, pertussis (whooping cough) and Tetanus.

Driving license	Is an official document which states that a person may operate a vehicle, such as a motorcycle, car, truck, or a bus, on a public roadway.
Economic activity	Covers all market production and certain types of non-market production, including production and processing of primary products for own consumption, own- account consumption (owner occupied dwellings) and other production of fixed assets for own use.
Economic Dependency Ratio	Is measured as the ratio between economically dependent persons (sum of unemployed, inactive, and children aged five and under) and employed persons, multiplied by 100
Employed persons	Persons in paid employment who work for wage or salary in cash or in Kind or both and have a formal job attachment.
Employment	This includes all wage and salary earners and managers in all businesses, and directors actively working in incorporated businesses. It includes that working full-time or part –time and those who are permanent or temporary.
Employment status	Refers to the status of an economically active person with respect to his/her position at hi/her place of place of work and his/her mode of remuneration.
Enterprise	This is a single legal entity or a combination of legal entities. It may also be a sole legal unit carrying out one or more activities at one or more locations it may also be several establishments.
Establishment	This is an economic unit engaged in one or predominantly one kind of economic activity under single ownership or control and is situated at a single physical location.
Exports	Outward flows comprising goods leaving the economic territory of a country to the rest of the world.
Foreign reserves	They consist of those external assets available to and controlled by the central Banks for direct financing of balance of payments imbalances, for indirectly Regulating the magnitude of such imbalances through the intervention in Exchange markets to affect the currency exchange rate, and/or for other purposes. Included are monetary gold, Special Drawing Rights (SDRs), reserve position in the fund, foreign exchange assets (consisting of currency, deposits and securities) and other claims.
General Fertility Rate (GFR)	Is defined as the number of live births per 1,000 women ages 15-49 years in a given year.
General Hospitals	These provide preventative, outpatient curative, maternity, inpatient health services, emergency surgery, blood transfusion, laboratory and other general services. They also provide in service training, consultation and

	research in support of community- based health care programmes.
Gini Coefficient	The Gini coefficient is a measure of statistical dispersion intended to represent the income distribution of a nation's residents.
Gross Domestic Product	The value of goods and services produced within economic territory of the country.
Gross Enrolment Rate	The ratio of pupils in primary school (regardless of age) to the country total population aged 6- 12 years.
Gross intake Rate	The ratio of pupils enrolled in primary one regardless of age to country total population aged six years.
Gross Output	The production value as compiled from total receipts from industry and non-industry goods and services in an economy, adjusted for stock changes but excluding Excise Duty and Indirect taxes. This is Gross Output at factor cost.
Health Centre	Is a clinic staffed by a group of general practitioners and nurses. Typical services covered are family practice and dental care, but some clinics have expanded greatly and can include internal medicine, pediatric, women's care, family planning, pharmacy, lab, and more.
Homicide	The killing of one human being by another human being. The recruitment, transportation, transfer, harbouring or receipt of persons, by means of the threat or use of force or other forms of coercion, of abduction, of fraud, of deception, of the abuse of power or of a position of vulnerability or of the giving or receiving of payments or benefits to achieve the consent of a person having control over another person, for the purpose of exploitation. Exploitation shall include, at a minimum, the exploitation of the prostitution of others or other forms of sexual exploitation, forced labour or services, slavery or practices similar to slavery, servitude or the removal of organs.
Human trafficking	Illicit drugs are drugs that have been banned or made illegal by the government. These drugs are dangerous and can have many side effects, including death.
Illicit drug	Illicit drugs are drugs that have been banned or made illegal by the government. These drugs are dangerous and can have many side effects, including death.
Imports	Inward flows of goods from the rest of the world into the economic territory of the country.
Index Number	A number that shows relative change in price or volume between the base period and another period.
Industry	This is an economic activity undertaken by a business establishment as specified in the ISIC.
Infant mortality rate	Infant mortality rate is the probability (expressed as a rate per 1000 live births) of a child born alive in a specified period dying before reaching the age of one.
Injured persons	Are accident victims having suffered trauma requiring medical treatment (with or without hospitalization).

Insurance Policy	Is a contract (generally a standard form contract) between the insurer and the insured, known as the policyholder, which determines the claims which the insurer is legally required to pay. In exchange for an initial payment, known as the premium, the insurer promises to pay for loss caused by perils covered under the policy language.
Intermediate Consumption	This is the value of goods and services that are used in the process of production of other goods and services rather than final consumption.
Kerosene	This is fuel used as illuminate for lighting and in some cases for cooking.
Killed persons (in road accident)	Are accident victims who die immediately or within thirty days following the accident. Before 1 January 2005, the time period considered was only six days.
Labor force	Currently active population aged 14 to 64 years who were "employed or unemployed" during the last 7 days.
Labour force participation rate	Ratio of all economically active persons aged 14 – 64 years to the total number of persons aged 14- 64 years.
Large Business	Business establishment employing 100 or more persons.
Life Expectancy at Birth	The average number of years a new born is expected to live given the prevailing deaths rates.
Life insurance	is a contract between an insured (insurance policy holder) and an insurer or assurer, where the insurer promises to pay a designated beneficiary a sum of money (the "benefits") upon the death of the insured person. Depending on the contract, other events such as terminal illness or critical illness may also trigger payment. The policy holder typically pays a premium, either regularly or as a lump sum. Other expenses (such as funeral expenses) are also sometimes included in the benefits.
Literacy	Is the ability to both read and write with understanding (self-reported)
Loan	A loan may be money or securities supplied by one party (the lender) to a second party (the borrower) in a transaction in return for a promised future payment by the borrower. Such transactions normally include the payment of interest due to the lender as per agreed repayment schedules between the two parties.
Marital status:	Personal status of each individual in relation to the marriage laws or customs of the country and defined in the Census in five categories: Never married: an individual who has never been in a union; Married: an individual who was in marital union at the moment of the Census, legally or not; Divorced: an individual who has been separated from his or her spouse through a court decision, according to legislation; Separated: an individual who has separated temporarily from his/her

	<p>spouse and is awaiting the court decision; Widowed: a man or a woman who has lost his or her spouse by death, not yet remarried</p>
Maternal Mortality Rate	The maternal mortality ratio (MMR) is the ratio of the number of maternal deaths during a given time period per 100,000 live births during the same time-period.
Mean Age of Women at Childbearing (MAWC)	The mean age at childbearing is the mean age of mothers at the birth of their children if women were subject throughout their lives to the age-specific fertility rates observed in a given year
Minor	In law, a <i>minor</i> is a person under a certain age—usually the age of majority—which legally demarcates childhood from adulthood. The age depends upon jurisdiction and application, but is generally 18 years old.
National Referral Hospitals	In addition to the services offered at regional referral hospital, they provide comprehensive specialist services and are involved in teaching and health research.
Net Enrolment Rate	The ratio of pupils in primary school aged 6 – 12 to the country total population aged 6 - years.
Net Intake Rate	The ratio of pupils aged six in primary one to the country total population aged 6 years.
Non Traditional exports	Refers to commodities other than traditional exports that have recently featured in Rwanda' export trade.
Occupation	Refers to the nature of task and duties performed during reference period preceding interview by persons in paid employment, unpaid family work or self – employment jobs.
One stop center	Centers in charge of providing comprehensive response, care and support services for girls and boys, women and men who had survived gender based violence (GBV) or child abuse.
Overdraft	A type of a short term loan particularly used to supply short – term working capital to tide over the production cycle or finance for a seasonal requirements.
Passengers	Travelers in a car, bus, train, plane or ship who are not driving or part of the crew. These also include those embarked and disembarked.
Pension	A benefit, usually money, paid regularly to retired employees or their survivors by private businesses and federal, state, and local governments. Employers are not required to establish pension benefits but do so to attract qualified employees.
Petrol	This is a light hydrocarbon fuel used in positive ignition engines. Another name used for this type of fuel is premium motor spirit.
Physical violence	is the intentional use of physical force with the potential for causing death, disability, injury, or harm. Physical violence includes, but is not limited to, scratching;

	pushing; shoving; throwing; grabbing; biting; choking; shaking; slapping; punching; burning; use of a weapon; and use of restraints or one's body, size, or strength against another person.
Population Density	Population per unit area. The number of people living per unit of an area (e.g. per square mile); the number of people relative to the space occupied by them.
Prison	Place where people are kept as a punishment for crimes or while waiting for trial.
Prisoner	A person kept in prison as a punishment for crime or waiting for trial.
Private Households	Consists of one or more persons living together and sharing at least one daily meal.
Proportional morbidity ratio	This is the proportion attributable to a given cause of illness. It is a proxy for the prevalence of sickness in a population.
Psychological harassment	A form of mistreatment in which there is intent to cause mental or emotional pain or injury; PH includes verbal aggression, statements intended to humiliate or infantilize, insults, threats of abandonment or institutionalization; PH results in stress, social withdrawal, long-term or recalcitrant depression, anxiety
Public Liability Insurance	a form of insurance, compulsory for any business in contact with the public, which pays compensation to a member of the public suffering injury or damage as a result of the policyholder or his employees failing to take reasonable care.
Rape case	The crime of forcing another person to submit to sex acts, especially sexual intercourse.
Refined activities rate	Is defined as the quotient between the total economically active population in a given period and the population in productive age groups during the same period.
Regional Referral Hospitals	In addition to the services offered at the general hospital, these hospitals offers specialties services such as psychiatry, ear, and throat (ENT), radiology, pathology, ophthalmology as well as higher level surgical and medical services, including teaching and research.
Resident Population	Persons who have lived for more than six months in the place where they were enumerated or who intended to live for more than six months in that place. They represent the population usually living in a place.
Residents	Persons whose usual residence is Rwanda including those whose nationality is not Rwanda.
Retained Reserves	This is the increase in value of a currency or the increase in value of fixed assets consisting mainly of freehold land and buildings.
Revaluation reserves	These kinds of reserves arise due to the revaluation of

	fixed assets but cannot be paid out as dividends because they are not realized profits.
Road accident	A road accident refers to any accident involving at least one road vehicle, occurring on a road open to public circulation, and in which at least one person is injured or killed. Intentional acts (murder, suicide) and natural disasters are excluded.
Sex ratio	Is the number of males per 100 females in the population.
Sexual violence	Sexual violence (SV) is any sexual act that is perpetrated against someone's will. SV encompasses a range of offenses, including a completed nonconsensual sex act (i.e., rape), an attempted nonconsensual sex act, abusive sexual contact (i.e., unwanted touching), and non-contact sexual abuse (e.g., threatened sexual violence, exhibitionism, verbal sexual harassment). All types involve victims who do not consent, or who are unable to consent or refuse to allow the act.
Standardized Death Rates (%)	is a ratio between the observed number of deaths in an study population and the number of deaths would be expected, based on the age- and sex-specific rates in a standard population and the age and sex distribution of the study population.
Teaching Services	Teaching services comprises of teachers of primary schools, secondary schools, commercial and technical colleges and institutions.
The mean age at first marriage.	Is the mean age of men or women at first marriage if subject throughout their lives to the age-specific marriage rates of first marriages only in a given year.
Total Fertility Rate (TFR)	It measures the average number of births a group of women would have by the time they reach age 50 if they were to give birth at the current age-specific fertility rates.
Trade Balance	A Trade Balance, or Balance of Trade, is the difference between the monetary value of exports and imports of a specific country's economic output over a certain period of time. It is one of many economic fundamentals that affect the relative value of a country's currency. A positive or favorable balance of trade is known as a trade surplus when exports exceed imports.
Traditional Civil Servants	These are employees of line ministries and self-accounting government departments.
Traditional Exports	Refers to long term export cash crops introduced to Rwanda long time ago, that is coffee and Tea.
Treasury Bill	These are short- term bearer securities with maturities of 91 days, 182 days, 273 days or 364 days issued by Bank of Rwanda.
Under Five Mortality Rate: (%)	It is the probability (expressed as a rate per 1000 live births) of a child born alive in a specified period dying

	before reaching the age of five, if subject to current age-specific mortality rates.
Underemployment	Refers to persons who work less than 40 hours per week, but were willing and available to work additional hours within the last seven days.
Value added	The value of outcome when the factors of production interact to avail goods and services. Value added is the difference between the value of gross output and the value of intermediate inputs. Value added comprises of the following:
VAT	Is a form of consumption tax? From the perspective of the buyer, it's a tax on the purchase price. From the seller's perspective, it's the tax only on the value added to a product, material or service.
Wage Bill	All cash payment made by employers in return for labor provided by the employees. The payment includes salaries and wages, overtime, holiday pay, bonuses, commissions, sick leave and any other allowances paid in cash to the employees. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ✓ Compensation of employees ✓ Consumption of fixed capital (depreciation) ✓ ☒ Licenses ✓ Interest ✓ ☒ Operating surplus (usually) net profit or loss and other small items.

Executive Summary

The 2015 statistical yearbook is the seventh edition designed to serve as a compendium of statistical information dealing with a wide range of development pertinent topics. As such, this book is designed to serve as a standard summary of statistics on the social, political, and economic situation of Rwanda.

This edition shows the available data for fourteen fields namely: MDGs, EICV and DHS indicators, Gender; Health and Nutrition; Education; Environment; Agriculture; Energy and Water Production; Transportation and Communication; Travel and Tourism; Income, Expenditure and Wealth; Price Indexes; Banking, Insurance and Finance; Business Enterprise and Foreign Trade; and finally Law Enforcement, Court and Order.

MDGs, EICV and DHS indicators: Results of the 2013/14 EICV indicate substantial progress in poverty reduction and improvement in other socio-economic and demographic indicators in the last three years. The survey shows that poverty is at 39.1% as of 2013/14, down from 44.9% as was reported in 2010/11. During the same period, extreme poverty dropped from 24.1% to 16.3% and reduction of economic inequalities (Gini Coefficient dropped from 0.507 to 0.448).

DHS 5 has shown that maternal mortality ratio (MMR) has declined significantly to 210 deaths per 100,000 live births in 2014/15 down from 1071 in 2000 and child mortality dropped to 50% from 76% in 2010.

All MDGs indicators have been met, except the ones on poverty (39.1% vs. 30.2% target), stunting (38% vs. 24.5% target) and share of women in waged employment in the non-agricultural Sector (27.3% vs. 50% target). However, extreme poverty (16.3% vs. 20% target) and some health targets have been even exceeded the targets.

Health and Nutrition: According to the Ministry of Health report, health facilities increase from 1,036 in 2013 to 1,161 in 2014 which represent an increase of 12%. In 2014 the population per one doctor was 15,510. Number of Cesarean as percentage of total delivery was recorded at 40% in public health facilities, while prenatal deaths decreased by 8%. Deaths reported in public and Private health facilities have increased by of 2% compared, (11,085 total death in 2014 compared to 10,871 total death in 2013).

Education: The total number of students enrolled in pre-primary education increase by 12% from 142,471 students registered in 2013 to 159,291 students registered in 2014. In the year 2014, primary education counted a slight decrease of 0.11% in students enrollment, secondary education got a slight decrease of 0.2% from 566,370 students enrolled in 2013 to 565,312 students in 2014. In higher learning education, the number of students increased from 84,448 in 2013 to 87,013 in 2014. The major increase was recorded in Vocational Training Centres with 38% (15,592 student enrolled in 2013 compared to 21,566 student enrolled in 2014).

Environment: CO₂ gas emission per capita is estimated at 0.99 in 2013; Annual average temperature increases from 19.84 degree Celsius in 2012 to 20.63 degree Celsius in 2013 and remained constant in 2014. Total Average Rainfall (mm) slightly decreased

from 1,230.73mm in 2012 to 1,202.17 mm 2013 and 2014. The Value of minerals in USD has decreased by 7% (226,189,315 USD in 2013 and 211,361,714 USD in 2014).

Agriculture: Total Production of vegetables and fruits continued to increase, where vegetables production increased by 9% between 2011 and 2013, while fruits production increased by 18% in the same period. On the other hand vegetables exports counted an increase from 15.4 ('000 Tons) in 2012 which generated 5,013,260 USD to 31.9 ('000 Tons) which generated 9,494,442 USD. Animal products have gone up, especially milk from 628,266 tons in 2013 to 706,030 tons in 2014, meat and fish which increased up to 706,030 tons (628,266 tons in 2013), 86,348tons (81,087 tons in 2013) and 28,450 tons (24,550 tons in 2013) respectively in 2014.

Water and Electricity production: Electricity production increased by 15% and the number of electricity customers increased by 22% in 2014. At the same time, water production increased by 5% and the number of water customers increased by 16%. The total net income in 2014 was 13.3 billion (Rwf).

Transportation and Communication: The number of commercial passengers was counted to be 568,981 passengers in 2014 compared to 559,531 passengers in 2013. The number of vehicles increased also from 140,149 vehicles registered in 2013 to 152,085 vehicles registered in 2014. The mobile phone penetration has increased from 63 % in 2013 to 70% in 2014.

Travel and Tourism: the number of visitors has increased from 1,122,150 in 2013 and 1,219,529 in 2014. Especially in 2014, 90% of them used land as mode of transport, 87% of visitors in Rwanda are coming from Africa. In 2014 national parks counted 67,871 visitors, where 45 % of them went to Akagera national park and 64% where Foreign Visitors.

Income, Expenditure and wealth: In the year 2014, GDP at current prices was Rwf 5,389 billion, up from Rwf 4,864 billion in 2013. At constant price GDP was estimated at 4,685 billion. By shares in current prices, 47% of GDP was generated by tertiary sector (Service) compared to 33% generated by primary sector (Agriculture, Forestry & Fishing).

Prices Indexes: with a new rebasing of February 2014 = 100, CPI increased from 98.8 to 100.6 between January 2014 and December 2014. The PPI evolution came from 111.8 to 112.64 in the same period.


Banking, Insurance and Finances: In banking sector, commercial & hotels projects combined are the ones who obtained the biggest amount of loans in 2014 for medium and short terms (63,937,820,000 Frw and 181,401,666,000 Frw respectively), while Mortgage industries projects are the ones who received the largest amount of loans for long time (63,840,302,000 Frw) in 2014.

Law enforcement, Court and Order: In 2014-2015, 57,835 cases have been judged and 54,903 new cases were reported. Criminal and Civil cases were the most reported ones with 28,195 and 24,069 cases respectively in 2014.





Figure 2.1: Women in higher positions compared to men: General Prosecutor, 2014




Figure 2.2: Women in higher positions compared to men: Local Government, 2014



Figure 2.3: Primary education enrollment




Figure 3.1: Caesarian sections in District hospitals




Figure 3.2: Caesarian sections in referral Hospitals



Figure 3.3: Births reported in public health facilities





Figure 3.4: Prenatal deaths reported in public health facilities

Figure 3.5: HIV prevalence rate in VCT by Province




Figure 3.6: HIV prevalence rate in VCT by Sex



Figure 3.7: HIV voluntary tested by sex in 2010 to 2014



Figure 3.8: HIV+ prevalence among pregnant women by province in 2013



Figure 3.9: Number of couples tested for HIV



Figure 3.10: Physical violence reported in 2013 and 2014




Figure 4.11: sexual violence reported in 2013 and 2014




Figure 3.12: External New case in consultation





Figure 3.14: Deaths reported in public Health facilities





Figure 3.16: Number of Health Facilities



Figure 3.17: Number of beds by public health facility type



Figure 4.1: Pupils in Pre-Primary Education enrollment



Figure 4.2: Primary Education Pupils




Figure 4.3: Primary Education Qualified teachers



Figure 4.4: Primary Pupils per Province 2014



Figure 4.5: Primary teachers per province in 2014



Figure 4.6: Primary Schools per province






Figure 4.8: Secondary Education student




Figure 4.9: Number of Qualified Teachers in Secondary Education



Figure 4.10: Secondary Students by province in 2014



Figure 4.11: Secondary Students by level and sex (Senior One (S1) to Senior Six (S6))in 2014



Figure 4.12: Secondary schools, desks and classrooms per province in 2014





Figure 4.14: Students' enrolment in VTC'S





Figure 4.16: Higher Education learning students Enrollment



Figure 4.17: Student enrolment in tertiary education in Degree awarding institutions




Figure 4.18: Student enrolment in tertiary education in Diploma awarding institutions



Figure 4.19: Enrolment of students in tertiary education by exit award



Figure 4.20: Profile of tertiary education students per 100,000 inhabitants by sex



Figure 4.21: Profile of tertiary education students with disability in 2013



Figure 4.22: Profile of tertiary education staff by nationalities in 2014



Figure 4.23: Number of computers and internet connection in tertiary education by sector of education, 2014



Figure 4.24: Adult literacy centers by ownership in Rwanda, 2014



Figure 4.25: Total Adult literacy learners by sex in 2014








Figure 5.3: Value of minerals in USD






Figure 6.1: Production of major cash crops in Tons



Figure 6.2: Land area under production for major cash crops '000 Hectare




Figure 6.4: Evolution of Meat Production (in Tons)

Figure 6.5: Fishery Production Annual Total (in Tons)





Figure 7.1: Total production of electricity (Kwh)



Figure 7.2: Electricity Exportation and importation (Kwh)





Figure 7.4: Total Water production in Rwanda (m³)









Figure 8.3: Registered vs Active Pay TV Subscribers



Figure 8.4: Evolution of internet subscribers



Figure 9.1: Evolution of Tourist Arrivals



Figure 9.2: Total Parks Visits in 2014



Figure 9.3: Visits of National Parks by nationality in 2014



Figure 9.4: Accommodation facilities in Rwanda



Figure 9.5: Number of Gorillas



Figure 10.1: Macro-economic aggregates





Figure 12.1: Outstanding loans by maturity on 2013 and 2014 (in Frw thousands)



Figure 12.2: Evolution of Average exchange rates of Foreign Currencies in Rwf



Figure 12.3: Changes on USD and EURO currencies in 2014



Figure 12.13: RSSB/Pension Members by sex




Figure 12.14: RSSB/Pension Membership




Figure 12.15: RSSB/Pension Income




Figure 12.16: RSSB/Pension Contributions by Contributors





Figure 12.17: Total Number of Institutions by Categories





Figure 12.19: Rwanda's external trade (values in US\$ million)



Figure 13.1: The most five partners of RWANDA in the Imports





Figure 14.1: Cases in Court Year 2014-2015



Figure 14.2: Total Judged cases



Figure 14.3: Total Number of driving licenses delivered by categories



Figure 14.4: Roads accidents: Number of victims and died persons


